programming, mathematics, and engineering! The Edison Robots are dynamic learning tools for the STEM classroom. Students are able to code the robots to perform a variety of tasks including movement, music, obstacle detection, sound detection, and more. The robots teach students computational thinking and computer programming in an engaging, hands-on way. Students have already learned how to build and code the EdCrane and EdDigger. Students have also taken on other coding challenges such as applying their knowledge of shapes to code Edison to make turns of specific degrees, creating obstacle detection programs, and using music and movement to code Edison dance parties. The possibilities are endless when coding, engineering, and Fairview Tigers come together—thank you to Edison and TOSHIBA!

Computer Science Family and Friends Night

Computer science is for everyone—anyone can and should learn to code! This fact was demonstrated during Fairview's Computer Science Family and Friends Night in January. If you were unable to attend, here's what you missed!

For one hour on a Monday night, parents, teachers, friends, students, and members of the community packed into a classroom to play student created video games! Throughout the fall semester, nineteen FHS students learned how to program in the Python language. The computer science students dedicated three weeks towards programming hundreds of lines of code resulting in a wide variety of fun, interactive, and creative games.

Computing makes up 2/3 of projected new jobs in STEM, yet only 35% of schools teach computer science—Fairview being one of them! In elementary school, students are introduced to STEM activities and basic coding concepts. As of 2018, each student at FMS takes four mini courses in computer science. These courses develop students' programming fundamentals, preparing them to take higher-level classes in high school. In addition to programming, Fairview's computer science curriculum teaches valuable skills such as problem solving, creativity, logic, teamwork, digital literacy, and more. Regardless of the career that students pursue, the skills they learn in computer science will open doors they never thought possible.

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New Future Ready PA Index Shows Student Achievement and Growth in the Fairview School District

Pennsylvania's new school evaluation tool, the Future Ready PA Index, shows students in Fairview School District are high achieving and preparing for life after high school.

The Future Ready PA Index measures college and career readiness, such as industry-based learning and access to rigorous courses of study, student academic improvement, and growth on a variety of indicators – reducing the reliance on standardized test scores as the sole measurement of a school's success.

"Our students are more than standardized test scores," Director of Curriculum, Justin Zona said. "The Future Ready PA Index provides the community with a more holistic picture of our schools' performance beyond test scores with a transparent and easy to use tool."

As the tool was being developed, educators, parents, and community members from across the state, including Erie County, provided input to the Pennsylvania Department of Education on the measurements and evaluation indicators that should be considered for the Future Ready PA Index.

The Future Ready PA Index provides insight into the dynamic work taking place in the Fairview School District. Various indicators that are being measured include:



High School Graduation Rate (i)




• Fairview Middle School shows an ability for students in grades 5-8 to show academic growth in the areas of Mathematics and Science as indicated by the table shown right.



Career Standards Benchmark (i)


• Fairview Middle School measures career experiences that students receive. According to the table below 100% of the students reached Pennsylvania's benchmark.

Fairview Partners with Safe2Say Something

In 2018, the General Assembly passed Act 44 mandating the establishment and use of the "Safe2Say Something" (S2SS) anonymous reporting system by every Pennsylvania school entity by January 14, 2019.

S2SS is a life-saving and life-changing school safety program that teaches students, educators, and administrators how: (1) to recognize the signs and signals of individuals who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others, and (2) to anonymously report this information through the S2SS app, website, or 24/7 Crisis Center Hotline. The following provides an overview of how the program works and will be implemented in schools:

HOW IT WORKS

- 1. A tip is submitted via mobile app, website, or phone call—arriving first at the S2SS Crisis Center.
- 2. Crisis Center analysts vet and triage the tip, then engage the tipster in anonymous two-way chat in order to provide detailed and immediately-actionable information to schools and dispatch.
- 3. Crisis Center analysts deliver the tip to the impacted school and, as needed, local law enforcement via 911 County Dispatch.
- 4. The school and, as needed, local law enforcement, assess and intervene with the at-risk individual.
- 5. The school then closes out the tip and reports actions taken as a record for their school.


PROGRAM BACKGROUND

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) has established S2SS and will manage and maintain the program. The OAG, in partnership with Sandy Hook Promise (SHP), a leader in anonymous reporting systems, has built

out the app, website, and PA-based 24/7 Crisis Center. SHP is a national non-profit committed to creating safe schools and communities through their four evidenced-based Know the Signs intervention programs. To date, SHP has delivered its programs to 10,000+ schools and trained 5+ million youth and adults in every state resulting in countless suicide, school shooting and firearm threat interventions and countless bullying, drug use, and other acts of violence and victimization interventions.

TIP PROCESSING

OAG Crisis Center analysts are trained to vet and triage tips by: (1) conducting 2-way anonymous dialog with tipsters to gather missing information and ensure enough information is provided for schools and local law enforcement to act upon, (2) categorizing each tip as either "Life Safety" or "Non-Life Safety," for ease of prioritization by tip recipients, and (3) delivering the tip to the impacted school and, when needed, its local law enforcement via 911 county dispatch.



From the Classroom to the Workplace

The 18-19 school year has seen the addition of a life skills classroom at Fairview High School. This program, which has been a major success, and allows students with severe cognitive disabilities to be educated in their home district. Our Life Skills program focuses on teaching and helping students develop functional, adaptive, and social skills. Life skills instruction combines academic, daily living, occupational, and interpersonal skills to teach students how to live and work in the community.

A major part of the Life Skills program is the Work Awareness and Transition course (WAT) that gives students the opportunity to learn and develop job related skills. The course is an elective geared to students who are capable of benefiting from classroom instruction and supported community work experiences. Work experience may be supplemented by work around the school building or in the classroom and in the community.





Students explore potential careers, identifying their interests and strengths while building the work skills, habits, and behaviors necessary for successful employment. Work experience placements are designed to meet student needs and can be in community or school settings.

Fairview Middle School Prepares Students for Life Beyond FSD

Fairview Middle School created career pathway courses that all 8th grade students began taking during the 2018-2019 school year to help prepare them for meaningful engagement in their high school education, and post-secondary decisions, whether that be technical training, military, workforce training, or enrollment in a college or university.



These pathway courses afford every student the opportunity to analyze career options based on personal interests, abilities, aptitudes, achievements, and goals. The main objective is to help students prepare a personal high school plan with career goals and select high school courses based upon their career interests.

Each pathway is a broad grouping of careers that share similar characteristics and have common employment requirements. Career pathway planning is an educational approach to course scheduling, which helps students focus their education toward career development. The five career pathways are clusters of occupations or careers that are based on the national career clusters. In a career pathway system, students choose a pathway that will prepare them for

employment in the cluster that best fits their interests and abilities.

Students in eighth grade have the opportunity to learn more about career pathways through specially designed courses that focus on each pathway. These courses focus on exposing students to each of the possible pathways. Students access career and interest surveys to determine their strength areas and become acquainted with the five career pathways while exploring possible career choices. Home Collection Program for Household Hazardour Waste (HHW)

As part of the residential solid waste and recycling contract with Waste Management, effective immediately, you have a convenient opportunity to dispose of your household hazardous waste - safely, easily and responsibly. The *At Your Door Special Collection*SM program, a residential service offered by Waste Management, continues to provide year-round collections for you.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

1.To Participate, you must set up a collection appointment.

Our representatives will guide you through the steps toward a safe and successful collection. A kit will be sent to your home in plenty of time for you to gather and pack your materials.

2. Preparing for collection

The collection kit includes an instruction sheet and other items to help pack and secure your household generated hazardous waste (HHW). Please read the instruction sheet included in the kit.

3. Material is collected


On the scheduled date, the service technician will collect HHW directly from your home. They will sort and pack the HHW for proper transportation, recycling and disposal. Participants will receive a postage-paid survey card to complete and mail back to help track the program.

4. You have more HHW than will fit into the Kit?

Don't worry! Remember, this service is available year-round. Just schedule another collection! Small quantities may be combined with your neighbors. NEW FENCES NOW REQUIRE A ZONING PERMIT

Fairview Township Supervisors amended an Zoning Ordinance in 2018 requiring a zoning permit for most fences 4 feet and higher. Fences may be installed and located up to a property boundary and are not regulated as to which direction it faces. Fences on public street corners shall not obstruct the Clear Site Triangle Area. Fences shall not exceed 4 feet in height in a front yard in a residential district.


