## KEEPING YOUR STREAMS AND LAKE HEALTHY...

### 1. GET YOUR LAWN AND GARDEN OFF DRUGS!

- Limit the use of chemical pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers — and avoid using chemicals entirely in wet weather.
- Pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers run off into creeks and streams — and eventually into Lake Erie. Fertilizers add excessive nutrients to natural waters that lead to algae bloom, bad odors from lack of oxygen, and fish kills. Pesticides and herbicides kill fish and their food sources.
- Consider using compost instead of fertilizer and natural means to control pests and plant disease.

### 2. FEED YOUR STREAM RIGHT

- Never pour oil, grease, detergent from car washing, gasoline, antifreeze, paint products, carpet-cleaning chemicals, pesticides, herbicides, or other toxic substances down street storm drains. Storm drains flow directly into creeks, which flow directly into Lake Erie. All of these substances are toxic to fish and other stream-dwelling organisms. Grease and oil coat fish gills, deplete the oxygen supply, and smother bottom-dwelling organisms.

### 3. DON'T PLUG YOUR ARTERIES

- Dispose of garbage at your curbside pickup or landfill — not in creeks or streams. Some people think of creeks as garbage dumps. Look in our streams, and you'll find shopping carts, mattresses, car parts, plastic, cans, Styrofoam, yard debris, and paper litter. Debris creates dams that cause flooding and erosion. Litter is mistaken by wildlife for food and can be toxic or cause starvation. Backed-up water is a breeding place for rodents and mosquitoes. If you need help removing or disposing of debris, contact your Borough, Township, or Chamber of Commerce, who can direct you to local volunteer organizations.

## Is your home address visible from the road?

Visibility of your street number is absolutely imperative for first responders to reach you in the event of an emergency. Placement of your street number at the end of your driveway will allow Fairview Fire & Rescue, Lake Shore Fire Department, West County Paramedics, or the Pennsylvania State Police to assist you as quickly as possible. Finding your home or business, especially at night, can be very difficult if your street number is hidden, or partially obstructed, unlit, or has missing numbers. Whether emergency personnel are responding to a medical emergency or a structure fire, clearly visible street numbers can save valuable time which can save lives or structures. Please take the time to check the visibility of your street number as every minute is crucial in an emergency.

## Driveway Permit Information...

Any new driveways or driveway improvements require a driveway permit. Driveway improvements include paving, repaving, widening for the purpose of adding additional lanes, modifying a driveway entrance, or installing or replacing a culvert pipe. The permit needs to be submitted to the Township Zoning Administrator by the owner or authorized representative of the owner. Please contact the Fairview Zoning Office for assistance at 814-474-5942.

## Winter Reminders...

Do not push snow onto the roads at any time. This can cause hazardous road conditions for motorists.

Please help the fire departments by removing snow and ice from hydrants. Clear a wide enough path to walk around the hydrant. Remember that in an emergency, every second counts.

During the winter months the Supervisors request that you refrain from parking on Township roads in order to allow the snow plows to properly and efficiently clear the roads for your safety.

## Home Collection Program for Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

As part of the residential solid waste and recycling contract with Waste Management, effective immediately, you have a convenient opportunity to dispose of your household hazardous waste - safely, easily and responsibly. The *At Your Door Special Collection<sup>SM</sup>* program, a residential service offered by Waste Management, continues to provide year-round collections for you.

### HOW DOES IT WORK?

#### 1. To Participate, you must set up a collection appointment.

There are three ways to schedule a collection:

Our representatives will guide you through the steps toward a safe and successful collection. You will be asked several questions, including your address and the type and amount of HHW available for the pick up. You will be provided a convenient collection date and information about where to place the kit for collection. A kit will be sent to your home in plenty of time for you to gather and pack your materials.

#### 2. Preparing for collection

The collection kit includes an instruction sheet and other items to help pack and secure your household generated hazardous waste (HHW). Please read the instruction sheet included in the kit.

#### 3. Material is collected

On the scheduled date, the service technician will collect HHW directly from your home. They will sort and pack the HHW for proper transportation, recycling and disposal. Participants will receive a postage-paid survey card to complete and mail back to help track the program.

#### 4. You have more HHW than will fit into the Kit?

**Don't worry!** Remember, this service is available year-round. Just schedule another collection! Small quantities may be combined with your neighbors.
