From the Desk of the Superintendent:



We pride ourselves in the Fairview School District on preparing students for life beyond the four walls of Fairview High School. This preparation comes in many disciplines, including academics, athletics, and the arts. Our students leave with a strong academic foundation, an understanding of teamwork and sportsmanship,

and an appreciation for music and art. Our students leave Fairview ready to excel in the job force, trade school, the armed forces, and college. Additionally, Fairview students leave with something that we feel is equally important; they leave with caring hearts, open minds, and the appreciation and gratitude of serving others in and around our community.

Although we see our students' kindness on a daily basis, two recent incidents have demonstrated how our school community truly steps up in times of need. In early October, The Upper Room, a local homeless shelter, expressed a critical need for hygiene supplies. With just one social media request, the donations from our families poured into the schools. After just one week of collections, we were pleased to deliver nearly 50 boxes with thousands of items to The Upper Room.

Earlier this month, a devastating house fire claimed the entire belongings of a local Fairview family, leaving several Fairview students without necessary clothes and supplies. Before we could put out a call for support, our students, parents, teachers, and community members began brainstorming ways to assist the family. We were honored to take a small part in helping one of our Fairview Family members during a difficult time.

We boast that we "Develop the Whole Student" in the Fairview School District, and we are confident that we do this as well as any district in the state. This development would not be possible, however, without the family and community partnerships that make our schools a special place to learn and grow. They say it takes a village to raise a child; our students are fortunate to live in a village that does it with such class.

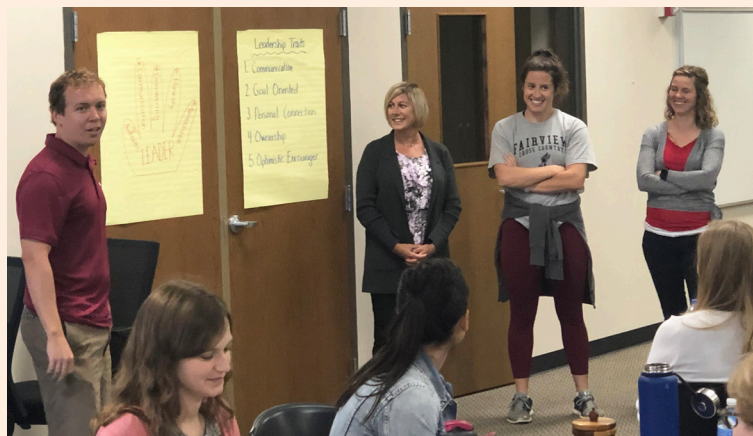

Fairview School District Launches Leadership Program

The Fairview School District has launched a new leadership program, Aspire to Lead (AtL), for the 2019-2020 school year. The AtL is made up of teachers and other district employees who wish to enhance their leadership potential. Superintendent Dr. Erik Kincade, along with Director of Curriculum Dr. Justin Zona and Special Education Supervisor Mr. Keith Nies are leading the team. The idea for a leadership team stemmed from a summer leadership workshop where the administrative team was charged with the task of developing leaders in the organization. Dr. Kincade stated, "We pride ourselves on growing leaders from within the district. We are fortunate to hire the very best teachers and support personnel in the area, and helping these high quality people grow into leadership and administrative roles is extremely rewarding."

The group has nearly 30 members, including teachers from all three buildings, IT specialists, and our very own School Resource Officer, Deputy Ras, participating in the program.

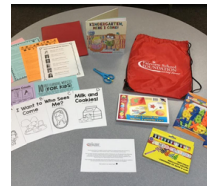
OUR IMPACT

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI

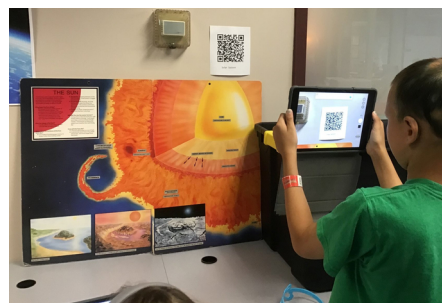

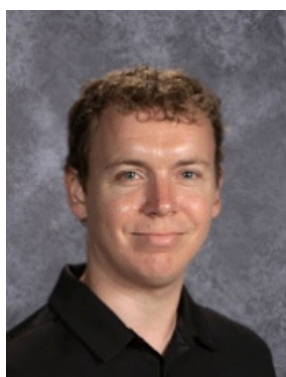

New Vans Spruce Up Transportation

The Fairview School District has made some upgrades in transportation. The addition of two 10 passenger vans has provided more flexibility when transporting students. The first 10 passenger van, commonly referred to as “Big Red,” was purchased this past February and immediately made an impact on our travel needs. A second van purchase was made in September when the District partnered with the Fairview Athletic Boosters. The boosters recognized a need for an additional van to support our student-athletes and therefore made a significant contribution making this purchase possible. This white 10 passenger van is wrapped in Tiger Pride!

The vans have made it more comfortable for our golf team to travel to matches, near and far, while having golf equipment in tow. The water polo team was able to utilize the van to participate in the Wildcat Invitational over 300 miles away. Our boys and girls varsity basketball programs have used the vans in the off season to compete in league play in both New Castle and Cambridge Springs, while the girls’ middle school basketball team was able to travel to a tournament in Girard. Our varsity cross country teams used both vans in late September to run in the McQuaid Invitational in Rochester, NY.

More versatility will be noticed when our teams return to state competitions. Tennis, Cross Country, Swimming, and Track have all made these trips in the past. The vans will help transport our teams with comfort and style.

Frequently Asked Questions

WHAT IS THE DECENNIAL CENSUS?

Every 10 years, the federal government conducts a population count of everyone in the United States. Data from the census provide the basis for distributing more than \$675 billion in federal funds annually to communities across the country to support vital programs—impacting housing, education, transportation, employment, health care, and public policy. They also are used to redraw the boundaries of congressional and state legislative districts and accurately determine the number of congressional seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO ME?

Responding to the census is not only your civic duty; it also affects the amount of funding your community receives, how your community plans for the future, and your representation in government. Specifically, data from the 2020 Census are used to:

- Ensure public services and funding for schools, hospitals, and fire departments.
- Plan new homes and businesses and improve neighborhoods.
- Determine how many seats your state is allocated in the House of Representatives.

WHEN WILL I COMPLETE THE CENSUS?

The next census will take place in 2020. Beginning in mid-March, people will receive a notice in the mail to complete the 2020 Census. Once you receive it, you can respond online. In May, the U.S. Census Bureau will begin following up in person with households that haven't responded to the census.

HOW CAN I RESPOND?

In 2020, for the first time ever, the U.S. Census Bureau will accept responses online, but you can still respond by phone or mail if you prefer. Responding should take less time than it takes to finish your morning coffee.

WHAT INFORMATION WILL BE REQUESTED?

The decennial census will collect basic information about the people living in your household. When completing the census, you should count everyone who is living in your household on April 1, 2020.

WHAT INFORMATION WILL NOT BE REQUESTED?

The Census Bureau will **never** ask for:

- Social Security numbers.
- Bank or credit card account numbers.
- Money or donations.
- Anything on behalf of a political party.

WILL MY INFORMATION BE KEPT CONFIDENTIAL?

Strict federal law protects your census responses. It is against the law for any Census Bureau employee to disclose or publish any census information that identifies an individual. Census Bureau employees take a lifelong pledge of confidentiality to handle data responsibly and keep respondents' information private. The penalty for wrongful disclosure is a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment for up to 5 years, or both. No law enforcement agency (not the DHS, ICE, FBI, or CIA) can access or use your personal information at any time. Data collected can only be used for statistical purposes that help inform important decisions, including how much federal funding your community receives.

The Census Bureau has a robust cybersecurity program that incorporates industry best practices and federal security standards for encrypting data.

FROM YOUR FAIRVIEW TOWNSHIP TAX COLLECTOR:

Once again, we are wrapping up another year. The time just seems to go faster and faster. At least the fall weather has been enjoyable here.

If your taxes have not been paid by November 1, you will receive a "Final Notice" within the next few weeks. Sometimes payments cross in the mail so if you have paid, please contact me and I will check to verify if I have received your payment. Please contact your escrow company if you escrow your taxes and you have unpaid taxes, especially if you have an interim tax bill.

Office hours beginning November 1 are by appointment only. This is stated on your tax bill. You may contact me either by phone or email. I have a slot in my office door if you wish to just drop off a payment. If you want a paid receipt, please include a self-addressed, stamped envelope with your payment. It is also very helpful if you put your phone number on your payment so if there is an error, I will be able to contact you immediately.

The following insert will be with your final notice. PLEASE READ:

YOUR REAL ESTATE TAXES HAVE NOT BEEN PAID ON TIME, AND A PENALTY HAS BEEN ADDED TO THE AMOUNT YOU OWE. IF NOT PAID BY DECEMBER 31st YOUR REAL ESTATE TAXES WILL BE DELINQUENT. PLEASE READ THE BACK OF YOUR FINAL NOTICE BILL.

NOTE:

1. Payments after December 15th **MUST** be remitted with certified funds – cash, cashier's check or money order. Please put your phone number on checks and money orders. Non-certified payments will be returned.
2. **Payments must be in my possession by December 31, 2019. Postmark is not accepted.**
3. Office hours November 1 until March 1 are by appointment only as stated on your bill.
4. **The office will be open Tuesday, December 31st regular hours. If paying with cash, please have exact change.**
5. You may use the door slot for tax payments at any time up to and including December 31st. I check this daily.

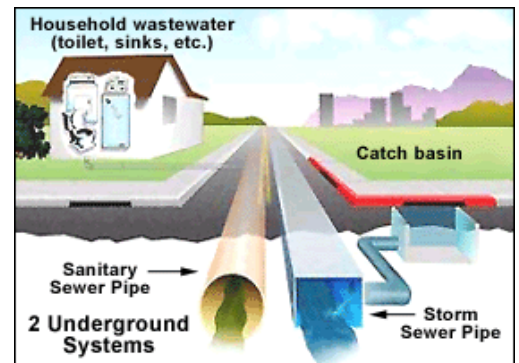

The Fairview Township Sewer and Water Authorities

have updated their billing software to accept payments from customers using on-line access. You can sign into our website (www.fairviewsewerandwater.com) and pay your water or sewer bill by completing the necessary information to make ACH or Bank Transfers to us. Paying with a credit card does have fees associated with the processing of the credit card that are passed onto the customer. The software has the ability to email your water or sewer bill to your email, eliminating the small postcard in the mail. 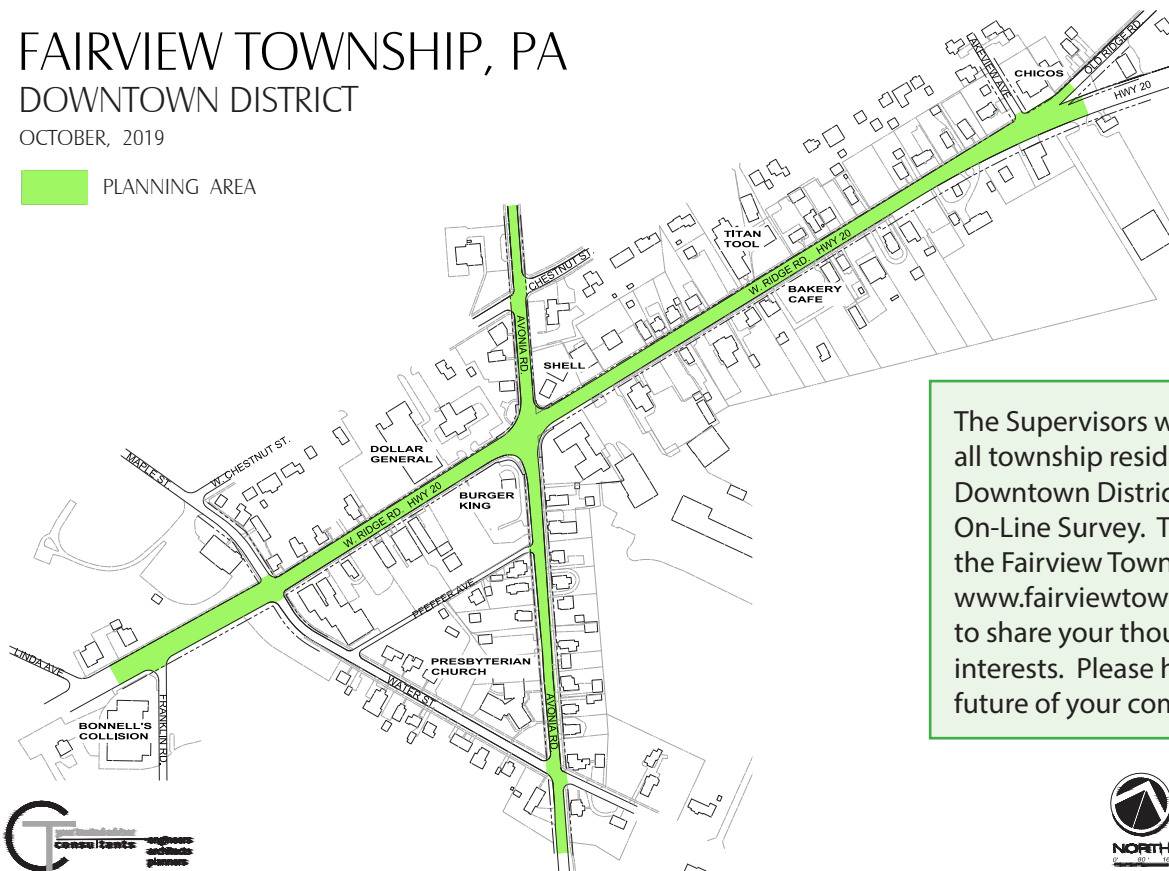
The Fairview Township Water Authority has awarded a bid to Chivers Construction in the amount of \$310,000.00 for replacement of approximately 2800 feet of water main in the White Swan Woods area. The project is expected to take eight weeks to complete. Streets to be affected are Shadyside, Old Mill from Shadyside to Lake Shore, Lake Shore Drive to Foxglove and a small portion of Ridgeview. As the infrastructure continues to age, more projects of this type will be required.

Driveway Shoveling: Best Practices



To help keep your driveway clear of snow this winter, always
shovel to the right-hand side of your driveway, and clear the
left of your driveway. This will help minimize the amount of
snow that gets pushed into your driveway from plowing.

Never shovel snow from your property into the road.

FAIRVIEW TOWNSHIP

Shovel in the direction of traffic. →

Clear snow from the area to
the left of your driveway, to
avoid plows pushing it into
your driveway.

DRIVEWAY

Pile snow on the right-hand
side of your driveway.

Remember: It is illegal and a safety hazard to push snow from your driveway on to the road.
